School trips and visits

We have already been busy with two trips this term, both thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Kingfishers Class had an amazing visit to Bristol Museum and Art Gallery to support and inspire their Egyptians topic:



What I enjoyed in the museum was the fact how they had real ancient things such as a ball they used but it was wrapped in string and was shaped like a square and did not bounce. Eagles Class and Hawks Class went to Longleat Safari Park to support their learning about Rainforests and Australia:

'We saw lots of animals such as koalas, otters, sloths, bats and meerkats. It was a very good experience and to go with friends. We learnt a lot of new facts about koalas. One of them was that koalas eat 900 different types of Eucalyptus leaves and one of the leaves is heart-shaped. What is UIFSM?

Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) in England provide a <u>free</u>, nutritious school lunch to all pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2, regardless of family income. Parents do not need to apply for this entitlement; it is automatically offered by state-funded schools. Taking up this meal supports children's health and concentration.

If you would like to book your child in for a free school meal, please contact the school office to register with Lataca, our catering provider.

Free School Meals and Pupil Premium

What is the Pupil Premium?

- The Pupil Premium is an additional amount of money given to schools by the government to improve the educational outcomes of disadvantaged pupils.
- The funding is allocated to schools based on the number of eligible pupils they have each school year.

Please can we ask you to check if you are eligible to receive free school meals. For every child that receives a free school meal, the government will give the school a Pupil Premium of £1,300. We use this money to give extra support to Pupil Premium children. The quickest way to apply is online at: https://parentportal.wiltshire.gov.uk/web/portal/pages/home

Car Park, Parking and School Drop-Off

Thank you so much for your continued support in not using the school car park. This has allowed easier access for the school bus and enabled our after-school club teachers to park.

A reminder, and for our new parents:

When dropping off and collecting your child from school, please use the pavement and do not walk across the road or the roundabout. This is important for everyone's safety and will also help to teach your child road safety.

May we also remind parents to be considerate of the safety of children and other road users and residents by remembering the following:

- Please park considerately in the village and do not park across driveways, or at the entrance to our car park
- Please be aware that the bus struggles to get through KSM if cars are double-parked anywhere in the village
- Please be patient and do not overtake cars that are using the morning drop-off system
- Please drive slowly through the village it is very busy with pedestrians crossing the road
- Please only drop your child off in the marked Drop-Off zone when a staff member is present
- No children should be left unaccompanied at the school gates, at any time

Parents may only park on school grounds when dropping off and collecting their child from The Nest or after school clubs.





Norbot

School Census Day - Thursday 2nd October - Special Lunch Menu!

Why is taking a meal on Census Day important?

- **Funding:** The number of children receiving a free school meal on Census Day directly affects how much funding the school receives.
- School Provisions: More funding allows the school to provide better provisions for the children.
- **Government Record:** The school provides information to the Department for Education (DfE), and the meal count on this day gives the government a snapshot of how many children eat school meals.

What can you do on Census Day?

- Encourage your child to take the free school meal: If your child is in Key Stage 1 (Reception, Year 1, or Year 2) or is otherwise eligible, encourage them to take the offered free school meal on Census Day.
- Consider packed lunches less often: If your child normally brings a packed lunch, consider letting them try the school meal on Census Day.

Lataca, our catering provider, are offering a special menu on Census Day of hot dogs / veggie dogs, chips and ice cream with chocolate sauce and sprinkles. (There will be other menu options available too).
